Fast Facts

- For over 230 years, Landmarks for Families has provided community and residential services to children and families seeking help in the Lowcountry.
- The first municipal orphanage to open in the United States in 1790.
- Landmarks for Families is the longestoperating nonprofit organization in South Carolina and has served thousands of children and families.
- One of the first organized efforts at early childhood education in the United States.
- Landmarks for Families is nationally accredited by the Council on Accreditation, indicating the nonprofit's commitment to achieving the highest standards of quality and best practices in its field.
- Landmarks for Families is accredited by the Teaching-Family Association, a rigorous process that ensures that program standards are met with fidelity, reliability and consistency.
- In 2023 alone, Landmarks for Families served 1,100 children and families through our education, preservation, reunification and residential programs.

Program Outcomes

Residential:

86% of youth were discharged within 9-12 months, meeting national best practice standards.

65% of youth were discharged in under 12 months, with **52%** successful (i.e., reunifying with a family or transitioning into independent living – going out on their own, e.g., apartment, roommate, self-sufficient).

81% of youth who were in the care of Landmarks for Families for 30 or more days had visitations with their family.

58% of youth in placement at Landmarks for Families remained stable with the nonprofit or were successfully discharged.

Community:

An evaluation of Landmarks for Families' 2022 parenting program by an independent third-party evaluator determined that the nonprofit met or exceeded program fidelity standards in all categories, including Community and Environmental, Target Population, Program, Staffing and Curriculum.
